## C. Notes on the content

This book touches on all aspects of life from the point of view of holiness. All life is sacred to the Lord and every aspect of it is to belived in the light of the Lord's character and testimony. This is the practical lesson of Leviticus while the theological lesson relates to the need and application of sacrifice and redemption.

The program of holiness sees the believer as both a product and a worker. It is both a privilege and a response. The holiness of the worshipper is the Lord...that is what sets him apart from every other form of life and spirit. As the worshipper lives he learns to express that gracious relationship in the many different walks of life. If he fails to do so...he is contradictory of "holiness."

In this regard we may summarize the concept of holiness along these lines:

- --it is founded on (in) sacrifice
- --it is expressed in separation
- --it is witnessed in the practice of life
- --it is demonstrated in living with others.

God is initiator in the process and it is His, being set apart for us, that reflects in us a life, being set apart for Him.
