c. Summary notes:

The great burden is to accept and stand in the liberty in which Christ has made us free. It is not a lawlessness but a state of complete dependence upon and subservience to the Lord Himself. It is the only life that can support honest "boasting" (rejoicing) and is granted freely. It is obvious that without proper care one can be bound up in the former bondage rather easily. So the Apostle urges watchfulness and care that this does not happen.

5. Ephesians and Colossians

a. An overview:

Ephesians may have been quoted as early as AD 95 and was definitely referred to Paul by the end of the second century. Since 1798, however, this view of its authorship has been under attack.
