- c. Psalm 119 is the most noted of the group and we take a few moments for notes on it.
 - (1) This long psalm features an arrangement of 22 stanzas, 8 lines in each. The Hebrew alphabet used does not have the consonant "sin" and this is a more complicated feature of Hebrew than I plan to take up just now.
 - (2) The theme is that of meditation on the law of God. Verses 1-3 introduce this subject and there is very little else in the psalm that does not reflect this.
 - (3) The idea of the law of God is mentioned in every verse and the following terms are used for this designation. I will mention some shades of meaning for each but they are, as a body, very close to one another and sharp distinctions cannot be practically maintained.
 - --law
 - --testimonies
 - --ways
 - --precepts
 - --statutes
 - --commandments
 - --judgments
 - --word.

The terms occur in both singular and plural mode. I have listed them in the order of their occurrence, I think, and it is probably intentional that the wide concept "law" is first and the overall concept "word" is last.

(4) A careful reading of the psalm will indicate the following uses for the law. and my list is not exhaustive:

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
