Now, I mentioned that the general things that were predicted in the prophecies regarding Egypt fall around two centers:

- (1) Nebuchadnezzar's conquest of Egypt, and
- (2) A prophet's restoration of Egypt. They fall around those two centers.
- (1) Nebuchadnezzar's conquest and
- (2) (I mentioned here in the middle of this page some place)
 The restoration of Egypt after Nebuchadnezzar's conquest.

So, actually you have about six chapters in the Old Testament, the heart of which regards Nebuchadnezzar's smashing of Egypt and Egypt's later being restored, not only as a political force, but also a spiritual force. Now, having pushed that in mind, take my chart, hold it gently between your fingers and see what the smudges look like! ______ finger smudges, naturally, not my chart smudges! Charts mean very little to anyone except the guy who makes them! very, very little ______ I make more almost than you believe, and they mean very little to anybody except to me, but to me they are priceless. I have never thrown one out yet, although this one looks less meaningful than others, but here's the peculiar thing -- What I have done is try to put in parallel columns the aspects of the citations from Isaiah 19, Ezekiel 29, 30; Jeremiah 40 and 46 that relate to the prophecies regarding Egypt.
