k. Summary:

The revolution tended to dissassociate the American churches from the old world counterparts even where there was no political friction. The independence and assertiveness that the revolution bred almost incidentally made the native sons more indpendent... sometimes even defiant...of the older order. The ultimate price would be in the proliferation of church bodies and the ferocious development of an innumerable number of cults and sectarian bodies. Freedom, as most of its champions found out, has a peculiar price.
