a. Cultic varieties

I have in mind the centers or ethical areas in which the cultic groups develop and I mention a few of these quickly:

- (1) Theosophic: those cultic groups entertaining the ideas of a higher knowledge of God by virtue of a new or special revelation of a spiritual knowledge apart from the Bible. Best examples are probably modern theosophy, Rosicrucianism, etc.
- (2) Power: Cultic ideas that concentrate on dy[namism and the mastery of others. In our day the scientology group is in this class. Most of the "mind over matter" are also members.
- (3) Occultic: The bodies that deal with (or concentrate on) Satan worship, demonishm, necromantic practices, and the like. Growing in this day but always on the circumference of the professing body.
- (4) Esoteric: Groups claiming to have a developed picture of some biblical truth and thereby promoting it to an extreme or even anti-biblical understanding.
- (5) Personality: Those who find life in the supposed revelations and disclosure of a supreme master or teacher of varied pretensions. In other words, the group builds itself around the personality and teaching of a gifted or competent leadership person.
- (6) And finally, there are groups that incorporate all of these to some degree...the "New AGe" movement has bits of all.
