EXODUS

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I. Introduction to the course

- A. This is essentially a content study of a biblical book. Our main concern is not technical but practical in the look at what the book teaches, what it shows in the pattern of biblical revelation. We look at critical or technical matters only as they influence our comprehension of the meaning of the book.
- B. The work of the student is in three parts:
 - To read the entire book during this period of study.
 - 2. To prepare a detailed, annotated outline of the book.
 - 3. To prepare short, written answers, to three questions per week as the parts of Exodus are noted in advance. (That is, the instructor will give three questions relating to the work for discussion in the next class and it is espected the student will write short answers for these. ... The more I try to say it simply the worse it gets..so in class we can have a better shot at it.
- C. We will procede on a section by section study...allowing some room for margin of time error. The work is divided like this:
 - Introduction and explanation of the course, basic data on the book: outline and background materials. Exodus 1-6..Life in Egypt or something like that.
 - 2. Deliverance from Egypt, analysis and consideration of Exodus 7-15 including notes on the plagues, the passover, and the deliverance through the sea.
 - Completing the discussion of 7-15 and working with the Deliverance from self in Exodus 16-24..through the early part of the wilderness and the giving of the law.
 - 4. Establishment of a worship system: Exodus 25-40 and a special emphasis on the tabernacle and priesthood.
 - Completion of 25-40 with particular attention on the grace of God in dealing with national sin and the covenantal promises of God to His people.
