--Englishman's <u>Hebrew and Chaldee</u>...useful but does not show the Hebrew context.

In using the lexicon nothing is more important than the reading of the preface to know how the lexicographer has put it together. This is also true for the concordance.

2. The concordance will help you put ideas and concepts together better than any other work, if you use it, and will show where the occurrences are and how they have been translated. Next to the dictionary, which is next to the text, the concordance is the most useful and necessary book in your library.
