4. Interrogative sentences are sometimes understood in the context when there is no key interpretative phrase, etc. A good example occurs in Genesis 27:24. An example of indirect discourse in the same vein may be seen in 1 Samuel 11:12.

Well, that is all there is to the supplementary grammar lessons as of 1984. I have re-written them (some in whole and some in part) five times over the last 15 years and am keenly aware that a lot of things should be added and probably a lot should be discarded. I appreciate your understanding of typing errors, poor references, etc., and just hope you will be able to use the syllabus as a tool for fast recall in your future work.
