In the Beginning (1975) A Jewish youth from a militant background seeks his own beginning on a life of his own.

(The depicted struggle is one with a hostile external world and a misunderstanding support base.)

5. <u>The Book of Lights</u> (1981)...The rabbinic chaplain looks for life support in less accredited Jewish circles and in a world totally unmarked by Judaism.

(The conflict is the reconciliation of values in a world that has continued well with no recognition of those values.)
