II. Thinking about the Book

A. The premise: theology must be rethought in the light of rational progress (particularly that of the enlightenment)...liberalism is wrong for it capitulated; fundamentalism is wrong for it refuses to think. The best answers are postulated by Barth and these may not be final but they suggest a system (scheme: paradigm) whereby the rational questions may be answered in an evangelical way preserving the integrity of all parties.
