COLUMN V.. is a note on what is cited

Just a word or two to identify the entity cited. Not much space is allowed on the pages I have prepared so you will need to write in small, neat letters! All you need is a tiny clue to help you know what is being discussed.

COLUMN VI...is in some ways the most important of our columns and has 8 sub columns..this is the column where you determine how the Old Testament quotation is being used.

I offer identification for the first four..please look at page two to see how it is set up.

- 1...is the column where you will mark the passage if
 it is a citation to show a prophetic fulfillment
- 2...is the column to be marked if you think the citation is chiefly to illustrate a point
- 3... is the column to indicate if the citation is being given to warn or rebuke
- 4...is the column noted for a citation being used to support a teaching or a doctrine.

Naturally some citations will be used in a number of ways..you may check all columns that you feel are relevant.

5-8 are columns undesignated. As you study you may become aware of some other usage for the citations than the four I have indicated. If you do, you may make another category and use it for other passage citations as well. If you come up with more than four additional use columns..you will need to make a larger chart! Hopefully that will not be the case.

This column is of great interest to us and will eventually help to crystallize questions of why and how the Old Testament citations are made.

COLUMN VII... is a column in which the character of the language is discussed.

You will see three subcolumns on the chart. The "L" stands for "literal", the "F" for "Figurative" and the "T" for "typical". I am concerned with the manner in which the citations are used and the column refers to the use given them. Is the citation literal in its application. I will discuss this with you in class and the discussion may help clarify it or again....

COLUMN VIII...is a column for comments that occur to you as you go. You may want to number them and jot them down on a separate piece of paper..you may not have any at all but questions and comments are indicate in this column.

And that is the chart on quotations!
