The second chart will be an "allusion" chart and the third will be a "suspicion" chart. These are both smaller and you will have to put in most of the material with regard to particular assignments.

We should learn a lot from it about how we might use the Old Testament and how vital it is we keep the Word of God intact. Some of our material will be hermeneutical in scope and some theological.
