And due to the sketchy nature of the course, this does not approximate an analytical outline but as with the others gives one a feeling for what is involved.

When the outlining is finished one has the idea that the deliverance of God is primary...deliverance from all that tends to keep us from knowing Him, including ourselves. The deliverance is by blood and power and through this we see the establishment of Abraham's family as the "great nation" promised of God. This involves the fulfillment of the time element mentioned in Geness 15 and the realization of the theocratic relationship between God and the people. Practically Exodus becomes instruction for the people of God to come 1 Cor. 10.
