mentioned here are onlyh a fraction of that list for Matthew. "L'Enfance du Christ" by Hector Berlioz is a dramatic oratorio telling the story of the flight into Egypt. Johann Sebastian Bach wrote his "Christmas Oratorio" and "St. Matthew Passino" on the beginning and end of the earthly life of Jesus. Some other works: "The Adoration of the Magi" by Heironymus Bosch (d. 1516), "The Flight into Egypt" by Giotto (1266?-1337) and a sculpture of Christ teaching, over the central door of the south portal of Chartres cathedral (c. 1200).

Our impression is that Matthew is seeking to show Christ as the Jewish Messiah. A number of features help in this presentation:

(a) Fulfillment of prediction. Note the nature of these fulfillments...you may want to check them out yourself:
